On 21 April 1921, the Rotary Club of Johannesburg, the first Rotary club in Africa, was chartered and so began and era of people exchanging ideas and creating lasting change. We call these friends, neighbours and leaders Rotarians... And in 2021, we will celebrate them.



FIRSTCLUBS

The history of Rotary in Africa began with the Rotary Club of Johannesburg, South Africa, in 1921. In 1929, the Rotary Club of Cairo, Egypt, brought Rotary to north Africa and a year later, the Rotary Club of Nairobi was chartered in Kenya, east Africa. The Rotary Club of Dakar, Senegal (chartered in 1939) was the first west African club.

OURLEGACY

"We will look forward to create a legacy and our legacy will be a Rotary African Mediators in Africa for Africa Vocational Training Team project which will help grow peace on our continent for the next 100 years!"

"We in Africa, especially in Southern Africa, are at war with ourselves. We need mediators. Even if we start off with just 100, we can train them and deploy them immediately," says DGE Annemarie Mostert, the chair of Rotary's Africa Centennial celebration.

This is no longer pie-in-the-sky thinking, she explains, but rather something which will become a reality. "As we celebrate 100 years of Rotary in Africa, we won't just be looking at our rich history or what we have achieved on the continent. We will look to create a legacy and our legacy will be a Rotary Peace project for Africa to help grow peace on our continent for the next 100 years!"

The launch of VTT Rotary Mediation Action for Southern Africa (RMASA) will be the highlight of the centennial celebration in 2021 and already, a Global Grant account that was established for this purpose, has been seeded with a donation of more than R100 000 from the Rotary Club of Pietersburg 100 (D9400). Much more funding as well as donations are needed from clubs, individuals and corporates to make this a reality.

According to Dr Dries Velthuizen and Dr Martin Rupiya, both members of the Rotary E-Club of Southern Africa

9400, the project is aimed at establishing Mediation Teams consisting of "African Mediators in Africa for Africa" in all Rotary districts of Southern Africa. The Mediation Teams will be independent from court-annexed mediation structures and any other existing dispute resolution initiatives. All mediators will be accredited with Mediators Beyond Borders International (MBBI).

A Rotary Vocational Training Team (VTT) will train African Mediators to render mediation services in Africa in collaboration with Unisa's Institute for Dispute Resolution in Africa (IDRA) alternatively The African Centre for the Constructive Resolution of Disputes (ACCORD).

The most suitable academic partner will still be confirmed, but the most suitable partners include the Institute for Dispute Resolution in Africa (IDRA) at Unisa, ACCORD (headquartered in Durban) and Mediators Beyond Borders International (MBBI), whose expertise lie in the field of Dispute Resolution, including customary African Dispute Resolution and in particular Mediation the African way. The short learning programme (SLP) will be in the form of blended learning: a combination of distance learning offered by an accredited mediation

training provider in collaboration with Unisa and a five-day capacity building contact workshop in collaboration with the academic partner and MBBI. Civil servants, the judiciary, magistrates, women, youth, practitioners and academics, media, members of parliament, religious groups, and peace activists from all countries in the mentioned districts will be among those who qualify for the SLP. The training will include twelve candidates from all the other Rotary districts in Africa, supplementing current initiatives rather than duplicating them.

On completion, a mentoring relationship will be established between participant students and the VTT. The purpose of this mentorship will be to visit targeted areas in the different districts and embed the essential knowledge into the operating environment of mediators after the SLP has been completed.

As a project partner, ACCORD is uniquely placed to contribute to the peace centre's success. In September 2005, ACCORD became the first African NGO in history to address the UN Security Council. Since 1992, the South Africa-based civil society organisation works throughout Africa to bring creative African solutions to the challenges

posed by conflict on the continent and continues to play an integral role in conflict resolution activities across the continent. The model ACCORD follows to achieve this, is recognised by the United Nations.

Mediators Beyond Borders International (MBBI), which has partnered with Rotary previously, will assist with accrediting the trained mediators.

The need for "African Mediators in Africa for Africa" resides within the Rotary Foundation focus area: Peace

and Conflict Resolution. The vision is to have credible independent accredited Mediators in every district in Africa.

This project will form part of a peace infrastructure that reaches across society while collaborating with African civil society and existing government structures.

The project will be governed by a steering committee . The members will include PDG Grant Daly, PDG Jankees Sligcher, DGE Annemarie Mostert, Prof Dr Martin


Rupyia of ACCORD, Prof Dr Dries Velthuizen of Unisa and Advocate Les Morrison from District 9400, Siham Bodha and Tom Bergmann-Harris of District 9350, Mr Ronnie Kasrils (retired politician and experienced dispute resolution practitioner), Chair of the MBBI, CEO Prabha Sankaranarayan, Steve Goldsmith, Operations Facilitator of the MBBI Southern California. The Governor's Council for Southern Africa (COSA) will form a Support Committee.
