and community clubs, she said: "We abide by high ethical standards including the Four-Way Test and are both a service and a humanitarian organization. We are leaders, have quality networks and are all about community service scaled globally. 

September is Basic Education & Literacy month

How can we improve education for all children?

We know that <u>basic education and literacy</u> are essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and economic development, and promoting peace. Literacy rates among adults and youths are on the rise and the gender gap in literacy is narrowing. But pressing global needs remain:

- 58 million children worldwide are out of school.
- 781 million adults are illiterate.
- Even after four years of primary schooling, as many as 250 million children cannot read and write.

Rotary supports activities and training to improve education for all children and literacy for children and adults. Just consider:

- If all women completed primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths.
- A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five.
- If all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty, which would be equivalent to a 12% cut in world poverty.

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On August 25, the WHO's African region was officially <u>certified</u> <u>free</u> of wild poliovirus. This certification comes four years after Nigeria – the last polio-endemic country in Africa – recorded its final case of wild polio and marks a major step toward global eradication of the virus. This means that five of the six WHO regions – representing over 90% of the world's population – will

have eliminated wild polio.

This progress is the result of a decades-long effort led by Rotary, our partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, and world governments. It has involved innovative strategies to vaccinate children amid conflict and insecurity, and a huge disease surveillance network to test cases of paralysis and check sewage for the virus.







Some 60 years ago, RC Johannesburg sponsored the studies of **Joseph Maphophe**.... he has been a Rotarian for the past 20 years and at the age of 86 is still serving his community and giving back!

Born in Limpopo in 1934, PP Joseph grew up in Johannesburg. After finishing high school, he attended Jan Hofmeyr School of Social Work but was forced to abandon the course after the first





year due to lack of funding. Dr Ray Phillips, Director of the school, secured a scholarship from the Rotary Club of Johannesburg to pay for the remaining two years.

Since receiving his Diploma, PP Joseph has worked as a Social Worker, Probation Officer, and HR Officer, and most recently as Chief Liaison Officer in Giyani Gazankulu. Shortly after his retirement in 1998, he joined the Rotary Club of Giyani and served as President for the 2004/2005 Rotary year.

Meet Lucille - one of the founding members of RC Johannesburg New Dawn. **Professor Lucille Blumberg** has been at the forefront of the fight against Covid-19 in her capacity as Deputy Director of the National Institute of Communicable Diseases; a position has held for the past 18 years. And her club is so proud of her!

After 5 months of extremely demanding work she is relieved to see the number of cases on the decline but warns against complacency. "Although the numbers are declining, we expect a resurgence. We have to open up the economy and get on with our lives, but remain



aware of the need to protect vulnerable groups," she says. One of Lucille's passions is identifying opportunities for helping communities in need. She has been involved in community work at Hluvekani in Bush Buck Ridge, near the Kruger Park, for many years – providing support to a crèche and wheelchairs to the community.
