He will be sorely missed in the Peace and Conflict Resolution area of focus. We also lost Rtn Malcolm Wishart of RC Ermelo Phoenix this month, and our deepest sympathies go to his club and family.

The Maputo Presidential Conference will take place on 4th-5th March 2022, and we look forward to a successful conference. I am still encouraging D9400 Rotarians and Rotaractors to attend en masse, to meet RI President Shekhar Mehta and several Rotary Leaders who are attending this very first Presidential Conference to be held in a Lusophone African country.

MARCH is WATER & SANITATION MONTH

Providing clean water is one of Rotary's areas of focus and so the Theme for the month of March is "Water & Sanitation". Clean water is a basic need for human beings. When people, especially children, have access to clean water, they live healthier and more productive lives. However, at least 3,000 children die each day from diseases caused by unsafe water, which is what motivates our members to build wells, install rainwater harvesting systems, and teach community members how to maintain new infrastructure.

While very few people die of thirst, millions die from preventable waterborne diseases, providing the impetus for our members to also improve sanitation facilities in undeveloped countries. Members start by providing toilets and latrines that flush into a sewer or safe enclosure and then add education programs to promote hand-washing and other good hygiene habits.

From the various water projects in which Rotary has participated, we have come to know the obstacles that many people across the globe face when it comes to some of the basic necessities of life. We tend to take for granted the clean and generally safe and plentiful water sources to which we have access.



Rotary International, through the combined actions of individual Rotarians and Rotary Clubs, seeks to assure that all people have adequate access to clean and safe water. The Rotary theme for March, <u>Water and Sanitation</u>, asks us to focus on the life changing improvements that we can make through these international projects to provide a more readily available and healthy supply of water to all people.

The problem is not that the world will run out of water (that amount is fixed through evaporation and re-condensation). The problem is the unequal distribution of water and the lack of universal proper sanitary practices to assure safe water for drinking. While some regions and peoples are certainly at greater risk than others and deserving of greater attention, we have seen recently that no population is free from concern. Water and sanitation issues will certainly continue to be an area of focus for RI and deserving of our attention as Rotarians. Consider the recent problems in South Africa, first in in Cape Town and now also in Gqeberha (Port Elizabeth).

Rotary is dedicated to seven areas of focus to build international relationships, improve lives, and create a better world to support our peace efforts and end polio forever. Water and Sanitation is one of those seven areas of focus.

Rotarian and friend, Prof Martin Rupiya, passed away on Saturday 12 February, in Zambia. He was a member of E-Club of Southern Africa, and facilitator of our ARCOM Peace Fellows. May his soul rest in eternal peace.




ANNUAL REPORT 2021



Holger Knaack, 2020-21 RI President and K.R. Ravindran, 2020-21 Trustee Chair of The Rotary Foundation have released the 2021 Annual Report. During the past Rotary year, we confronted turbulence all around us — a global pandemic, natural disasters, food insecurity — and used it as an opportunity to take care of one another, to personally adapt to and embrace these changing times, and to bring about lasting change for the people we serve. The challenges we all face are ongoing and the need to adapt will continue. But we can be proud of the fact that Rotary has not shrunk from this moment. We have embraced our role as people of action in difficult times.

The Rotary Foundation Expenditures: \$384 million



Rotary achieved remarkable successes in the past year which include:

- celebrating the <u>declaration of the WHO's African region</u> (all 47 countries) as free of the wild poliovirus
- introducing Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia as the first \$2 million Programs of Scale grant recipient. This evidence-based program aims to reduce malaria in 10 target areas over the next three and a half years, bringing health care to 1.3 million Zambians.
- adding the <u>environment</u> as a new area of focus. Rotary members can direct donations to this area and apply for global grant funding to address the effects of climate change and environmental degradation.
- re-envisioning the Rotary Peace Centers certificate program while also welcoming students to the first Rotary Peace Center in Africa. These Rotary Peace Fellows at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda, began a year-long certificate program in peacebuilding, conflict resolution, and leadership development. The peace center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, also now offers a year-long certificate program. The Otto and Fran Walter Foundation pledged \$15.5 million to The Rotary Foundation to fund a new peace center in the Middle East or North Africa that will focus on peacebuilding and development in the region.
- We set a fundraising record for The Rotary Foundation, raising more than \$440.9 million in 2020-21. But even more important than the headlines we earned is that we reached out to each other and showed the kind of care that defines us as a network of global friendship.
- Rotary worked with partner organizations to provide Learning opportunities for members and program participants. Toastmasters International produced an eight-course leadership and communication series to help members hone such skills as speechwriting and public speaking. And the National Youth Leadership Council provided material for new service-learning courses that teach our youngest participants how to address the causes of community issues, inspiring a lifelong commitment to service among these future leaders.
- Rotary members used their decades of experience in the fight against polio to support local health authorities' response to COVID-19. Members volunteered at clinics, combated misinformation, helped prevent the spread of the virus, and advocated for fair and equal access to vaccines.

In the coming years, we have the opportunity to increase our impact, expand our reach, enhance participant engagement, and increase our ability to adapt — as long as we continue to build on our <u>Action Plan</u> progress. The world today needs help bringing this pandemic to a close, reconnecting with each other in meaningful ways, and rebuilding the kind of trust necessary to restore global stability and establish a foundation of peace. This is our time. Together, let us make the most of it.

Rotary Action Group for Peace starts petition for Ukraine



There are over 50 Rotary Clubs and 24 Rotaract clubs in Ukraine. While we hope for peace and safety for all Ukrainians, we extend a special hope for the safety of all Rotarians, Rotaractors and their families at this time.

The Rotary Action Group for Peace, which represents Rotarians of all nations and ethnicities, has started a petition against the Russian invasion. The Rotary Action Group for Peace reminds Rotarians that we all share one language, and that is the language of peace. We do not support violence and war as a solution to conflict and differences.

Wild polio strikes in Malawi

... polio anywhere is a threat to children everywhere ...

Africa was declared free of indigenous wild polio in August 2020 after eliminating all forms of wild polio from the region. But now the health authorities in Malawi have declared an outbreak of wild poliovirus type 1 after a case was detected in a young child in the capital Lilongwe. This is the first case of wild poliovirus in Africa in more than five years.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) and Rotary International have <u>confirmed</u> that laboratory analysis shows the strain detected in a paralyzed child in Malawi is linked to the one that has been circulating in Sindh Province in Pakistan.

Although genetically linked to virus that circulated in Pakistan, it is an imported case from Pakistan. This detection does not affect the World Health Organization African Region's wild poliovirus-free certification status. Polio remains endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan.



It is more than three decades since Rotary launched its PolioPlus program and formed the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI).

The GPEI is supporting health authorities in Malawi to conduct a thorough assessment of the situation and begin urgent immunization and surveillance activities to mitigate any risk of spread.

The last case of wild polio virus in Africa was identified in northern Nigeria in 2016 and globally there were only five cases in 2021. Any case of wild poliovirus is a significant event and all resources are being mobilized to support the country's response.

New ENDPOLIONOW Coordinator





DG Stella Anyangwe has been appointed the EndPolioNow Coordinator (EPNC) for Region 28 (7 Districts) of RI Zone 22, from 1 July 2022. It is a 3-year term during which the EPNC works with RI and other EPNCs towards ending polio worldwide, and feeds back information to the Region for appropriate action. The appointment has been made by PRIP Ian Riseley, the incoming Rotary Foundation Chair.

DG Stella looks forward to the full support of D9400, especially now that a wild poliovirus infection has surfaced in neighbouring D9210 (Malawi). If Africa is to remain wild poliovirus free, ALL OF US must support the fight to End Polio by donating to PolioPlus/EndPolioNow, to ensure that polio vaccination continues in all countries of Africa. If one country has polio, all countries are at risk! The world IS a global village interlinked by air travel.

Some 35 countries participated in this event to showcase their projects.

It was also an amazing opportunity to tell the rest of the world of our District, projects, cultures and our beautiful countries. D9400 decided to showcase four projects our clubs are involved in. The projects showcased cover all four countries of our district – Eswatini, Mozambique, Botswana and South Africa.

Bianca Philo from Rotaract Johannesburg did a sterling job as program director, and thereafter President Angela Long from RC Johannesburg (oldest club in Africa) passed the baton on to Chicago One.

D9400 showcased four projects:

- Prof. Dries Velthuizen (RC E-Club Southern Africa) represented ARCOM, a project that has trained 100 African Peace mediators in partnership with the Makerere Peace Center and collaboration between three districts
- Ilse Jaquire (RC E-Club Southern Africa) presented a mental wellness program which will be rolled out to schools in our district.
- Lindiwe Dladla (RC Manzini) presented Days for Girls in Eswatini an empowerment project for girls in the area of menstrual hygiene;
- Lesley-Ann Maxwell (RC Springs) presented a Kindness Convention for our youth.

2022 THEME Groundwater: Making the invisible visible

The objective is to equip clubs and Rotarians with the knowledge and understanding of water borehole projects. Rotarians and Rotary Clubs will be informed by a panel of specialists about water boreholes and what a borehole project entails to provide water to needy communities.

WEBINAR: A panel of International and local speakers will deal with subjects ranging from community assessments through technical matters to water supply and project management. Discussions will also cover project costs and funding as well as

guidelines regarding TRF requirements and how experienced Rotarians in WASH-RAG can help clubs avoid pitfalls and compile Global Grant applications with the promise of financial benefit should a proposing club adopt the WASH-RAG recommendations. It is hoped that a club, having attended the webinar, will be better informed about water borehole projects and be able to make a sound assessment of potential projects to help the communities they serve, and take that project to a successful conclusion.

Rotary Club of Johannesburg New Dawn

February 23rd was an auspicious day for Johannesburg Rotary New Dawn. Sixty-two attendees, members and visitors, came together in Zoo Lake Park, where the club had planted an indigenous olive tree 12 months previously.

The cause for celebration was great, first International Rotary's 117th birthday, then the 100th birthday of Rotary in SA. We were honoured to welcome DG Stella, and particularly proud to receive her compliments for the diversity and energy of our club.





To add to the festive mood, seven new members were inducted, and some of the current members were noticeably moved when the inductees explained their motivations for joining Rotary.

Finally, and in keeping with the club's strong focus on the environment, Ian Widdop introduced Michael Baretta, Managing Director of [dot]Good, a leading cause marketing agency. Michael's innovative partnership with the Million Plus Recycling initiative and Fran Haslam, Managing Director of the Zoo Lake Users Committee, has enabled the installation of a recycling centre in the park. Club members were asked to bring at least one bag of plastic waste to take there after the main event, and the response was impressive. Everyone agreed the day had been successful and inspiring in every respect.





The Rotary Club of Rosebank together with the Highlands North Boys High School Interact Club members rolled up their sleeves for their first blood donation drive for 2022. They were joined by AG Jean Bernardo who also donated blood. As lockdown regulations are being relaxed, the Interact Club is planning to do four blood donation drives this year.

Patient blood management was key for improving South Africa's healthcare. Only 1% of the population in South Africa donates blood. This is not enough to maintain an adequate inventory to meet the country's blood demand, and results in regular supply shortages, which is now worsened further by Covid-19. Blood drives have been impacted by lockdown restrictions and many people including corporations, high school pupils, university and college students were unable to donate blood at their usual centres.

Rotary Club of Benoni


