Your help in getting the clubs to prepare and submit adequate governance documents of their clubs cannot be over-emphasized. For those AGs that are not yet doing so, your collaboration will be greatly appreciated. I also hope that more and more club officials will take the appropriate courses available in the e-learning platform of My Rotary, to facilitate the performance of their club duties. The AG mentor's role is deeply appreciated.

One of the highlights of the September theme of "Basic Education and Literacy" was having the South African Minister for Basic Education, Ms Angie Motshekga, as guest speaker at the RC Pretoria West club meeting of 28th September 2021. Her talk was on "Challenges and Opportunities in Basic Education, post-COVID". This showcased the much-valued collaboration between Rotary D9400 and National Authorities, on the different Areas of Focus of the Rotary Foundation that are also of vital importance to national governments.



JOIN IN THE FIGHT TO END POLIO

As World Polio Day approaches, the Rotary community is getting ready to amplify our message about eradicating polio to protect the world's children from this devastating disease.

Together, we've made tremendous progress. Now it's time to intensify our fight to make polio the second human disease ever to be eradicated. Last year, the World Health Organization's African region was certified free of wild poliovirus, showing that eradication is possible even in very difficult circumstances. The wild poliovirus remains endemic in just two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. We can use **World Polio Day** to advocate for the support we need to end polio in countries where it still paralyses children.

Did you know?

- Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.
- The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) was formed in 1988. Rotary and its GPEI partners celebrate a monumental achievement, say global eradication of wild polio is possible with the continued dedication and persistence of Rotarians. The World Health Organization on 25 August announced that transmission of the wild poliovirus has officially been stopped in all 47 countries of its African region. This is a historic and vital step toward global eradication of polio, which is Rotary's top priority.





What is polio?

Polio, or poliomyelitis, is a paralysing and potentially deadly infectious disease that most commonly affects children under the age of 5. The virus spreads from person to person, typically through contaminated water. It can then attack the nervous system.

The Story of the Man in The Iron Lung

Many might not remember that there was a polio outbreak in the 1950s where it was still a prevalent and debilitating disease that landed many children and adults around the world in Iron Lungs. While many have died, Paul Alexander, known as the Man in the Iron Lung, is one of the few who contracted polio and is still in an Iron Lung today.

When Paul Alexander was 6 years old, he contracted polio and was paralysed for life. Today he is 74 years old and is one of the last people in the world using an iron lung. This did not deter Paul from following his dreams. Read his story here.



DID YOUR CLUB PROMOTE BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY DURING SEPTEMBER?

One of the three focus points of Rotary is education – and with good reason. Literacy is regarded as a basic human right. So, how do we as Rotarians resolve the problems of education in an unequal society?

BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY MONTH

"If you are planning for a year, sow rice; if you are planning for a decade, plant trees; if you are planning for a lifetime, educate people" More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. That's 17 percent of the world's adult population. In order to be considered literate, a person needs to have passed at least Grade 7. School dropout rates remain a concern in South Africa. In 2019, the South African adult illiteracy rate was 12%, reflecting a significant improvement of 7.1 percentage points over the past decade. Despite this improvement, it is striking that 4.4 million adults in South Africa are still illiterate. South Africa's illiteracy rate is not far ahead of the global average of 14%11, and is therefore a matter of concern.

Although illiteracy levels are higher for females (12.5%) than males (11.6%), the gender gap in shares of illiteracy as well as illiteracy rates have narrowed markedly. School drop-out rates remain a concern in South Africa. We as Rotarians can resolve the problems of education in an unequal society.

Training teachers, establishing Interact and Rotaract clubs, mentoring students are some of the ways. Books for school libraries, available at the Humanitarian Centre, feeding schemes (a hungry child struggles to focus on learning), provision of donated school supplies and shoes for the school children, are also some of our projects. RYLA training camps inspire learners to expand their horizons and increase their enthusiasm for a better life.

Celebrating International Day of Peace and Supporting Girl Empowerment

To mark International Day of Peace, on 21 September, clubs and districts were encouraged to prioritise projects that improve the health, well-being, education and economic security of girls in their communities and around the world.



RI President Shekhar Mehta asked clubs to take on an initiative, district grant or global grant that engages members of their communities in a project that will protect and empower girls and increase equity by ensuring their access to resources that will improve their lives. Equality is a fundamental human right, and it's necessary for a peaceful, prosperous, and sustainable world. Still, girls and women worldwide face inequities in many areas, including health and education, and experience significant violence and disproportionate poverty.

"Our call to action is to leave no girl behind. Every Rotary Club should implement at least one **Empowering Girls** project this year RI President Mehta said. Advocating for Women's Rights

A new era is on the horizon in Africa as the first Peace Fellows arrive in Uganda. The **African Rotary Community Mediation** (ARCoM) project provides a platform to establish a conflict prevention community mediation initiative that involve Rotarians and non-Rotarians to deepen Rotary's peacebuilding work within and between communities. In an article published in Rotary News Magazine, Jew Moonde, who is on a peace fellowship in Uganda, shares his reasons for becoming a Peacebuilder and how this skill will empower him to influence change in his home country, Zambia.



A democratic country in Southern Africa, Zambia is, however, not known for its record on women's rights. As Jew Moonde explains, the country's deeply embedded patriarchal values have traditionally subjugated women in a variety of ways, some of them violent, some systemic. Gender discrimination has been woven into the fabric of Zambian society, he says, and as a result, when election time arrives, women's voices are not heard.

Moonde expects to return to his native Zambia as, among other things, an advocate for women's rights. "Women have not gotten a fair share of participation in the electoral process," says Moonde, 50, the peace and conflict manager of the Electoral Commission of Zambia. "And if women are not engaged in the political process, their grievances will continue building up. It is time for women to take a stand politically."



Zambia's recent elections have been marred by violence and intimidation, which breaks Moonde's heart. For nearly half his life, the Lusaka native has been a consultant with the Zambia Centre for Inter-Party Dialogue (ZCID); working with this Lusaka-based NGO, he's dedicated to building an infrastructure to ensure free and fair elections, whether by meeting with politicians to sensitise them to the gender imbalance or training people on how to manage conflict in the electoral process. After two decades, many of ZCID's legal reform proposals have been passed into law by parliament.

If you want change to come, empower people with the knowledge that they have the right to something, he believes. But getting women involved in the political process is only part of his mission.

Moonde, who has degrees in psychology and peace and conflict studies, wants to get the younger generation on board, too. "Politics is predominantly for old folks in Zambia, and unemployed youths are the implementers of violence, and they're also the victims." To engage them, ZCID focuses on social media outreach and youth-oriented community radio stations; it also helps young people develop skills that might one day help them find a rewarding career. If you want change to come, empower people with the knowledge that they have the right to something."

If all goes as planned during his peace fellowship, Moonde wants to acquire the knowledge to help transform ZCID into a statutory body: a permanent peace structure that provides an official platform for dialogue and mediation in Zambian politics. "I start hearing politicians talking and youths talking, exercising their rights to expression. It shows us that what we do has an impact on people. No one will help Zambians unless they do it themselves."

COMMUNITY MEDIATORS CAN HELP YOUR CLUB BUILD PEACE AND RESOLVE CONFLICT

The Mediation Centre for Africans in Africa (ARCoM) was established in 2020 and is up and running. ARCoM aims to train 100 community mediators (30 Rotarians and 70 non-Rotarians) to work in communities.

Our District has now trained several community mediators that are able to assist the Rotary Clubs and their communities in conflict situations. Every Mediator has to serve 100 hours attending to mediation matters and resolving conflict. They rely on the Rotary district and its clubs to make up these hours.

The role of the mediator is to facilitate dialogue and to guide the parties towards a mutual acceptable outcome or resolution and to build peace. The mediators have different skills and their involvement can vary from bullying in schools, gender violence etc.
